Antarctic on wheels

NOT many school students can make the trip to Antarctica, but now Antarctica can come to them.

The Mawson's Hut's Foundation's new Mobile Antarctic Classroom takes to the road today to give young Australians a lesson in our nation's history and continuing role at the forefront of science on the frozen continent.

Staffed by an Antarctic expedition, the refitted Toyota minibus will bring displays, exhibits and expert talks to schools and communities around NSW and Victoria.

Students will be able to

view samples of Antarctica's unique geology and try on the clothing worn by expeditioners in the extreme cold and learn about our foremost Antarctic hero.

The Chairman of the Mawson's Huts Foundation David Jensen said the Mobile Antarctic Classroom would take Antarctica to communities and schools in regional Australia.

"It is aimed at promoting Mawson's legacy and the history of Australia's endeavour in Antarctica," he said.

"It will be the first facility of its kind in Australia and allow the foundation to take the story of Mawson and Australia's work in the

Antarctic to regional areas," he said.

Sir Douglas Mawson led Australia's first Antarctic research expedition between 1911-14, when he and his team built five now heritage-listed huts at Cape Denison in Commonwealth Bay. The expedition charted much of the East Antarctic coast during an epic dog sled expedition. However, Mawson returned alone after his two companions died during the journey.

The Toyota bus was gifted to the foundation by Charles Lindall, who has visited Mawson's Huts on three occasions.

The Mobile Antarctic Classroom will make its first school visit next week.

Police hail tracker after man jailed

ONE of the first people in Tasmania to be fitted with an electronic monitoring device is in custody after breaching the conditions of a family violence order.

Tasmania Police said the 19-year-old Sorell man was identified as a high-risk family violence offender and had been fitted with one of the GPS anklets by order of the Hobart Magistrates Court.

But the man was arrested on Thursday and charged with failing to charge the device, failing to remain contactable with Tasmania Police via telephone at all times, failing to comply with all reasonable and lawful directions given to him by a police officer in relation to

electronic monitoring equipment and approaching within 500m of the person to be protected.

He was remanded in custody after appearing in court on Monday.

Senior Sergeant Penelope Reardon said the trial of the devices was proving effective.

"The fitting of the electronic monitoring device assisted police to readily locate the high-risk family violence perpetrator and has afforded

greater protection for a victim of family violence," she said.

"The arrest and detention of the perpetrator is evidence of the dedication of Tasmania Police to reduce family violence and the effectiveness of electronic monitoring of high-risk family violence perpetrators."

Some Tasmanian domestic violence perpetrators are being tagged and monitored as part of a \$25 million national trial to help reduce offending and increase victim safety.

The new electronic anklets — to be worn by high-risk offenders — are tracked by GPS.

Police and victims are notified immediately if an offender moves into a prohibited area.
