St Mary's College Policy

St Mary's College is committed to providing a safe learning environment for all our students. It is our policy that:

- we implement clear guidelines for the management of infectious diseases;
- we provide education, support and resources for staff, parents/carers, students and the wider college community on dealing with infectious diseases;
- teaching staff are trained to recognise symptoms of common infectious diseases and how to deal appropriately with children who become ill at college; and
- where appropriate, we seek advice from and liaise with the Department of Health about the occurrence of an infectious disease.

Parent/Carer Responsibility

Parents/Carers are required to:





- provide the college with an immunisation record upon enrolment of their child;
- keep children who have not been immunised at home during an outbreak of an infectious disease;
- take reasonable precautions against transmitting a condition if they know or suspect that their child has a transmissible notifiable condition;
- inform the Principal as soon as possible if they have reasonable grounds for believing that their child may have an infectious disease, has been in contact with an infected person, or has been diagnosed with an infectious disease;
- comply with college staff directions with respect to exclusion from and return to college due to the student's condition; and follow the advice of a doctor, Chief Health Officer or authorised public health officer/medical officer.

Immunisation Policy

St Mary's College encourages all staff and students to be vaccinated to protect them against the outbreak of infectious diseases.

Immunisation records are requested upon enrolment and stored in student medical records which are maintained in accordance with our Medical Records (Student) Policy. Prospective students will not be excluded from attending college, provided that the parent/guardian has provided a statutory declaration that either:

he or she has a conscientious objection to immunisation against that disease; or

believes that the child has been immunised against that disease but cannot produce any immunisation certificate or other proof of immunisation.

Infectious Control Policy

In the event of an outbreak of a vaccine preventable disease, it may be necessary to restrict attendance of nonimmune students or implement restrictions to protect these students and prevent further spread of disease.

The student may be excluded from college in accordance with the recommended minimum exclusion periods in the Tasmanian Department of Education School Attendance Procedures.



Infectious Procedures

Mobile phones and devices are to be switched off and placed securely in a student's locker before Homeroom begins at 8.25am and are not to be accessed until 3.15pm (from bell to bell) unless purchasing items with their device at Murphy's Café at recess or lunch time only.

Workers' Responsibility

All workers are responsible for ensuring that they:

- implement infection control practices to minimise the risk of exposure to infectious diseases for themselves and their students; and
- be aware of infectious diseases which they have been vaccinated against and keep their immunisation records up-to-date.



Implementation

This policy is implemented through a combination of:

- staff training and supervision;
- maintenance of medical records;
- effective incident notification procedures;
- effective communication procedures with the student's parents/carers; and
- initiation of corrective actions where necessary.

Discipline for Breach of Policy

Where a staff member breaches this policy St Mary's College may take disciplinary action.
